FREE OUTDOOR SUMMER CONCERTS

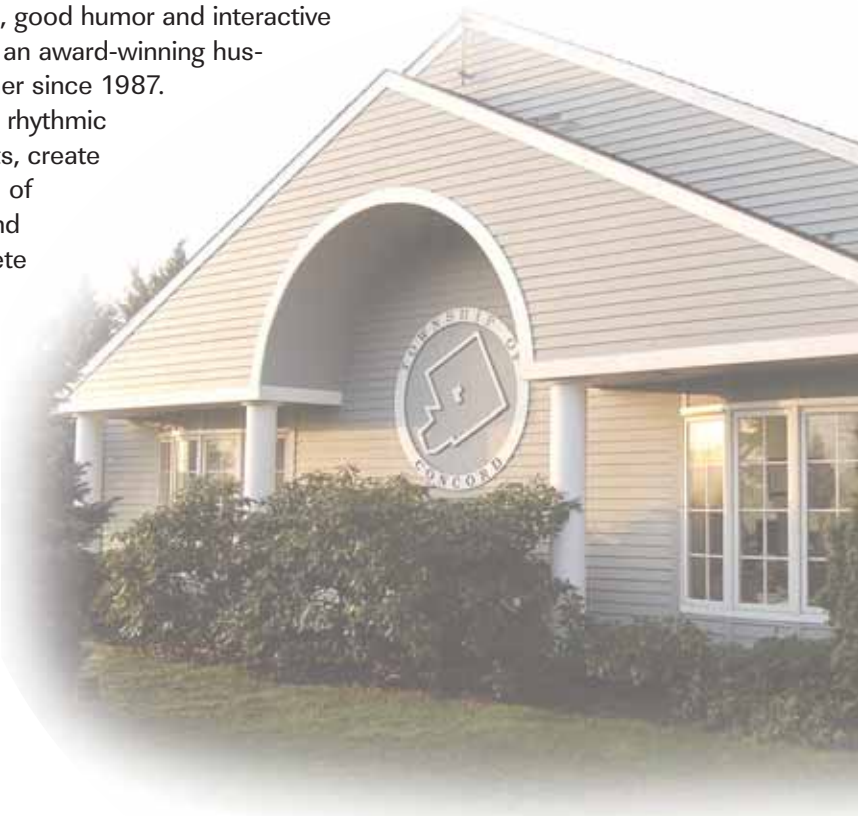

Two of a Kind delights audiences of all ages with their music, good humor and interactive performance style. Their beautiful harmonies, accompanied by David's powerful rhythmic guitar playing and Jenny's multi-ethnic percussion instruments, create magic on stage. ROAD IMPROVEMENTS

This summer, several roads will be improved as part of the township's annual road program: Featherbed Road, from Bethel to Kirk Roads; Waterwheel Way; Mattson Road, Conchester Highway to Concord Road; Newlin Way (portion); Cross Creek Lane; Running Spring Lane; Trimble Road, and Thornton Road to easternmost Twin Creeks Drive. Construction is anticipated to start early this summer, after the conclusion of the school year.

Additionally as part of this contract, gutter curb repairs and replacement are proposed for portions of Glenview Drive, Pole Cat Road, St. John's Drive, Concord Meeting Road/Jeremiah Collett Road, James Hayward Road and Minshall Circle. These plans are tentative and subject to change.

Three additional projects for this summer include:

- The full signalization of the intersection of Concord and Cheyney Roads, utilizing black powder-coated mast arms.
- The installation of a pre-emption device at the intersection of Baltimore Pike and Concord Road, to permit emergency vehicles from the Concordville Fire Station to safely access Baltimore Pike during emergencies.

Thanks to Senator Dominic F. Pileggi for his assistance in obtaining grants for the above two projects.

- The slip-lining of a deteriorated storm sewer on Andrien Road.

We look forward to completing these projects in a safe and efficient manner, with minimal disruption to township residents. Contact the township office if you have a concern or questions regarding these projects.

RESIDENTIAL SWIMMING POOLS

In compliance with the State Code, Concord Township has set the following regulations regarding residential swimming pools.

Definition: Any structure intended for swimming or recreational bathing that contains water over 24 inches deep. This includes in-ground, above ground and on-ground swimming pools, hot tubs and spas. Further, permanent pools are defined as: Those that are constructed on the ground or partially in the ground and all others capable of holding water with a depth greater than 42 inches, and all pools installed inside of a building, regardless of water depth, whether or not served by electrical circuits of any nature.

Mandatory swimming pool enclosures/barriers are required for all swimming pools containing water over 24 inches deep. Concord Township permits and inspects all permanent swimming pools. For additional information, including zoning regulations, you may contact the township Code Enforcement Department at 610.459.8911, extensions 13 or 14.

FINISHED BASEMENTS

As regulated by state law, the township no longer requires building permits for residential alterations (modifying/finishing interior areas), provided that the alterations do not include any structural modifications (changes to bearing areas of floors or walls). However, electrical and/or plumbing permits are still required. Homeowners are encouraged to call the township with any questions as well as to verify their contractor's licensing status.

CHILDREN'S PROGRAMS:

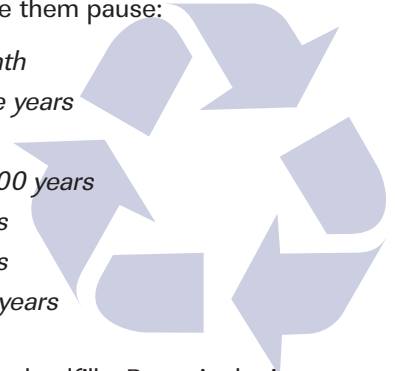

On Wednesday evenings at 6:30 p.m., there is a special story time for children and their families. The stories will appeal to children between the ages of 2-6. The more residents recycle, the less we put into our landfills. Paper is the item most frequently found and accounts for more than 40 percent of a landfill's contents! Recycled newspapers, phone books, office paper, cardboard, and mixed paper saves the equivalent of 78 million tree seedlings grown for 10 years.

Residents are encouraged to continue their recycling efforts by using the recycling area at our Public Works facility. Our second 2008 Recycling Day will take place on Saturday, October 11, 2008. For information on township recycling, check out our web site at www.twp.concord.pa.us.

Proof of residency will be required. Landscapers and businesses are required to have appropriate permits, have trucks weighed and will be billed appropriately.
